Our goals to build a more humane community by 2030:



Animals & Family

Total number of touch points with animals and families in our shelters and communities.

1 MILLION

- Eliminate barriers to responsible pet acquisition in all its forms to increase pet ownership in Metro Detroit by 7%
- Provide 100% of pet-owners in Metro Detroit with equitable access to veterinary care
- Impact human health and emotional well-being positively through pet ownership



Economic Impact

Annually, pet owners spend an average of \$1,380 on dogs and \$908 on cats.

\$1 BILLION

- Ensure our presence, programs and services are reflective of and are a natural part of the community
- Introduce 10,000+ students to veterinary career pathways through partnerships and education programs
- Increase number of pet-friendly work environments to improve the region's ability to attract and retain talent



Subsidized Care and Pet Food (Economic Impact)

Clients in need receiving pet food, low cost vet care and other resources for their pets.

\$38 MILLION

- Provide a value of \$800,000 in low-cost veterinary care to families with pets in need each year
- Distribute more than \$2.5M in pet food (7M bowls) annually to families in need
- Develop and maintain more than 125 human-service partners



Humane Education Hours

Hours spent with families positively impacting humane treatment of animals.

200,000 HOURS

- Provide 20,000 hours of humane education annually
- Respond to 4500 cruelty and rescue calls of suspected abuse with education and resources for those who care and prosecute those who don't
- Increase access to pet-friendly housing
- Partner with communities to develop walkable, safe neighborhood spaces for people and pets
- Work with civic leaders to advance policy and legislation for a pet-friendly community
